Jody Carr is an expert in Inclusive Education

He is from Canada and came to Inclusion Ireland to explain how inclusive education works in New Brunswick in Canada where he is from.



Some of the things we learned about the system in New Brunswick are:



There are no special schools or special classes.



Everybody goes to school together.



Where children live and how old they are helps them decide where to go to school.



In the laws in New Brunswick, they took out the word "special." They don't use the words special education like we do in Ireland.



For inclusion to work, politicians, teachers and families must all work together.



The government needed to plan for inclusive education and they used, values, research to help them think about education as a human right.



There are education support teams in every school and they can help students who need extra support.



A personalised education plan will also help teachers to know if a student needs some support



Students can pull out or leave class if they need to and get one to one support sometimes.



For exams, there are lots of different ways students in New Brunswick can show their work other than a test with a pen and paper.
